Pittsfield Academy was erected in 1930 on land donated by James Joy, owner of the Cotton Mill. Over 2000 pupils attended before its closing toward the end of the century. Many of its graduates went onto college at Dartmouth and became nationally famous individuals, such as John Swett, the California educator and Thomas W. Knox, the most popular author of boys travelogues during the Nineteenth Century




Pictured above is what the Society headquarters looked like in 1913. The building was moved from the northwest corner of Elm and Main Street, when James M. Batchelder erected what is now known as the Green Block in 1887. At that time the building was owned by shoe manufacturer Nathaniel S. Drake. It was occupied by John Rand who ran a dry goods store there. In April 1904, a partnership was formed between W. E. Foss and True Osgood and they moved into the building, now on Elm Street, to run a tin, sheet metal, plumbing and heating business. The Holy Name Society of Our lady of Lourdes Catholic Church purchased the building, The Society made extensive repairs to the

building, adding a kitchen and enlarging the main hall by 14 feet. It was used for meeting, suppers and an entertainment venue. In 1945 the building was sold to Catamount Grange #97 and used for its meetings and social gatherings. It was purchased by the Historical Society in 1994 and renovated adding insulation, new windows and a coat of paint. The inside was reconfigured to accommodate a museum, meeting room and archives.

PITTSFIELD FAMILY & CHURCH CEMETERIES
