Hall of Fame



At a recent Board meeting, Ferdinand F. French was elected to the Society's Hall of Fame. Mr. French was born in Pittsfield in 1848 and grew up on a large farm located on Eaton Road. He moved to Boston and became a

prominent businessman in the carriage manufacturing industry, working in several organizations either selling or producing high-quality carriages that were sold throughout the United States and abroad. He passed away in 1917.

2019 Programs

Historical Markers and Weathervanes!

This past year, the Historical Society had a wide variety of programs: A Walk Back in Time: The Secret of Cellar Holes presented by Adair Mulligan; Alice Brown's Tales of New England presented by the Pontine Theater; Cruising New Hampshire presented by Michael Bruno; and New Hampshire on High: Historic and Unusual Weathervanes presented by Glenn Knoblock.

Mr. Bruno, the author of *Cruising New Hampshire History*, took us on his exploratory journeys and how he became interested in the roadside historical markers located throughout the state. He explained the process, the research, and the criteria that goes into obtaining the state's approval for each marker. To more fully explain the process, he described in detail the background of three

established markers and one proposed site that he is currently exploring.

We in Pittsfield are lucky since the Historical Society has undertaken the project of researching and funding the historical markers found in the Town.

Mr. Knoblock's program, New Hampshire on High: Historic and Unusual Weathervanes of the Granite State, provided a brief history and explanation of the various features, functions, and shapes of weathervanes. He also detailed how a weathervane is made and weighted so that it turns with the wind! Thanks to Mr. Knoblock, we have a little background on the type of weathervane which now sits upon the new Pittsfield Historical Society's building. This program was made possible by a grant from New Hampshire Humanities.
