The Historical Society recently received a World War II Heart-Shield Bible/Catholic Prayer Book, as well as

various pins and medals from Ethel Miller. Heart-shield Bibles were designed to fit securely in the chest pocket of a soldier's uniform. plates were securely attached to the front cover of the Bible to stop a bullet from reaching a soldier's heart. This Catholic prayer book and manual of prayers and devotional exercises belonged to Cpl. Arthur St. Laurent and is dated September 1943. She also donated a hand-stitched kimono.



#### "When It Began" by Larry Berkson

In 1868 a lodge of the Good Templars was organized in Pittsfield and held regular weekly meetings in the Central Block Hall, located on the recent site of the Tuttle Block destroyed by fire in 2001. The fraternal order was created to further the cause of temperance and total abstinence from the use of alcohol. Unlike many of the organizations of the time, it admitted both men and women and individuals of all races. (The Gazette, January, 1867)
